On the other hand, excessive dependence on several economies may increase vulnerability to external shocks, supply chain disruptions, financial instability, and geopolitical uncertainties. Recent global events, including pandemic-related disruptions, inflationary pressures, and geopolitical tensions, have demonstrated the importance of evaluating economic resilience within international trade systems.

From a theoretical perspective, international trade theories emphasize that economic cooperation between countries depends significantly on comparative advantages, market size, production specialization, and institutional relationships. However, practical experience demonstrates that the sustainability of trade partnerships depends not only on trade volumes but also on the economic stability and performance of participating economies. Main Part.

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Kazakhstan occupies a strategically important position within Uzbekistan's regional trade system. Geographical proximity and strong transport connectivity facilitate intensive economic cooperation between the two countries. Kazakhstan functions simultaneously as a trading partner, transit corridor, and logistics hub connecting Uzbekistan with broader Eurasian markets.

Trade relations with Kazakhstan have expanded due to increasing regional integration and transportation infrastructure development. Agricultural products, food items, construction materials, energy resources, and industrial goods constitute major components of bilateral trade.

The economic stability of Kazakhstan contributes positively to regional supply chains and transportation efficiency. Since regional economic integration continues strengthening, cooperation with Kazakhstan provides opportunities for reducing logistics costs and improving export accessibility.
