Lucian Freud – The Realist of the Human Form. Lucian Freud (1922–2011) is known for his psychologically intense portraits. His paintings often depict the human body in raw,

honest form. Freud's work is deeply personal and captures the emotional complexity of his subjects. Famous works: *Benefits Supervisor Sleeping*, *Girl with a White Dog*

David Hockney – *The Colorful Modernist*. David Hockney (b. 1937) is one of the most influential living British artists. His work features bright colors and modern techniques, including digital art. Hockney often paints swimming pools, portraits, and landscapes that reflect his bold and joyful view of the world. Famous works: *A Bigger Splash*, *Portrait of an Artist (Pool with Two Figures)*

Painted when the artist was in his early seventies, this self-portrait reveals a distinct self-awareness and direct engagement with the viewer. Whilst Hockney at first appears to be looking directly into the eyes of the viewer, after close attention we feel that he is perhaps looking into his own eyes as he paints himself, perhaps using a mirror. And yet we can see that, on the piece of paper which he paints on, he has only made one brush stroke, whereas we are obviously seeing a complete portrait.

Tracey Emin – *The Voice of Personal Expression*. Tracey Emin (b. 1963) is a leading figure in contemporary British art. Her installations and multimedia pieces explore personal themes such as identity, love, and trauma. Emin became famous in the 1990s as part of the Young British Artists (YBAs) movement.
