Also, you should allow your students to use their home language for discussion or learning, but not always which makes them more respected and comfortable, but not always which can help educators value students' native languages and see them assets, not barriers. Furthermore, have your visual aids to your students like diagrams, charts, pictures to support and make the understanding of the learners easier and more entertaining. If you use these aids, only write the most important key words on them, not everything you tell keeping them academically. Then, explain everything briefly by simple words. These approaches make you a great and professional educator.

In conclusion, as values can be the cause of each educational practice and behavior expectations are culturally supported, conflicts are likely to occur when cultural issues are not appropriate addressed in the classroom. That has shown to be the key to effective English language learning with students of diverse cultures.
