This sentence can be interpreted differently depending on emphasis and context, making it structurally ambiguous.

Pragmatic Ambiguity

Pragmatic ambiguity depends on context and shared knowledge between the writer and reader (Allan, 1986). Uzbek headlines often refer indirectly to political, social, or cultural issues.

Such ambiguity requires readers to interpret meaning based on background knowledge, which increases cognitive engagement.

Wordplay in Uzbek Newspaper Headlines

Wordplay is a creative manipulation of language that often relies on ambiguity (Cook, 2000). It is widely used in Uzbek journalism to make headlines more expressive.

Puns (So‘z o‘yinlari)

Puns are based on words with similar sounds or multiple meanings.

Example: “Valyuta valyut bo‘ldi”

This playful expression emphasizes instability in currency using repetition and sound similarity.

Modified Idioms

Journalists often adapt traditional Uzbek idioms to create fresh expressions.

Example: “Oltin qo‘llar yana ishda”

This headline highlights skilled workers while maintaining cultural resonance.

Alliteration and Rhyme

Sound patterns such as repetition of consonants or rhymes make headlines catchy and memorable (Crystal, 2003).

Example: “Paxta pishdi, paxtakor peshqadam”

The repetition of sounds creates rhythm and memorability.
