These show how German can create very precise meanings in a single word.

## 5. Modern / technological compounds

**das Internet + die Seite → die Internetseite** (website)

**die Daten + der Schutz → der Datenschutz** (data protection)

**das Klima + der Wandel → der Klimawandel** (climate change)

These reflect social and technological developments.
